Living by the water's edge offers unique scenery

Simply looking at a body of water can soothe and inspire. Plenty of homes in San Francisco and Oakland enjoy aquatic vistas, but they're hardly the only places in the region where residences frame marine views.

"There's just something very peaceful about being able to see the water from your home," said Kathleen Olson of Olson Realty, Inc., who is listing 885 Wainwright St. in Benicia for \$778,000. The three-bedroom, two-bathroom bungalow offers views of Carquinez Strait from both levels.

Realtor Jeff Feagley of Feagley Realtors, who has been selling homes in Point Richmond since 1974, echoes

Olson's sentiments.

"The scenery is always changing, and watching the ships coming and going is peaceful," said Feagley, whose listing at 1328 Pelican Cove in Point Richmond overlooks Brickyard Cove and includes a 40-foot boat slip.

Besides being near the water, Olson pointed to Benicia's thriving art scene as another reason to appreciate the area. Of course, location is always paramount in real estate, and Benicia's setting situates it close to a variety of destinations, she said.

"Were only 35 miles from San Francisco, 25 miles from Napa Valley and 60 miles from Sacramento, so our location on the Carquinez Strait insulates us from most urban challenges while presenting us, conveniently, with the wonders of Northern California," Olson said.

Benicia, which juts out into the confluence of the Carquinzez Strait and Suisun Bay, hosts a number of parks and scenic outdoor recreation areas, including Turnbull Park, 12th Street Park and the Benicia State Recreation Area, which includes the Forrest Deaner Native Plant Botanic Garden and Dillon Point.

"Benicia's a protected environment with water on two sides, yet open to the bay with beautiful weather," Olson said.

Feagley similarly touted Point Richmond's geography as an enticing reason to live there. The neighborhood's microclimate enjoys a wealth of sunny days, while Angel Island acts as a barrier to the fog rolling in from the Pacific

Ocean.
"We'll watch fog banks over Marin and San Francisco, but it will be sunny with a little wind here," he said.

Gridlock seems to be a way of life for Bay Area commuters, but Benicia's sensible layout makes getting around town easy, Olson said.

"If you're leaving the city limits you'll encounter traffic, but in the community everything is very accessible," she said.

Feagley agrees that traffic is hectic and Point Richmond has a solution: The Richmond Ferry Terminal, which reopened in January and provides residents a direct route to San Francisco.

"Traffic in the Bay Area is only getting worse, it seems like the most civilized way to commute has to be the ferry," Feagley said.

Further inland, the masterplanned community known as Delta Coves offers 494 waterfront homes on Bethel Island. DMB Development began construction of the community earlier this year, which includes a fitness center, 4,500-square-foot clubhouse and private docks for every residence.

The development sits on the mouth of a lagoon that serves as a gateway to more than 1,000 miles of waterways and roughly 740,000 acres of preserve.

While Olson openly admits to being biased in favor of Benicia, she said buyers have ample locales to choose from when views of the water are a priority.

'There's a lot of opportunity for water views around the Bay Area."
